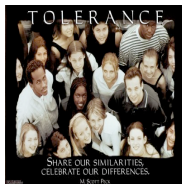
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Over time, tolerance has shifted from an ideal that was honored less in practice than in the breach, to a social imperative. But tolerance has its limits.

More than 800 people attended the dinner at the Fairmont Hotel. 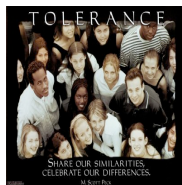

The Two Key Ingredients in Tolerance

One of the earliest statements of tolerance is "love thy brother/neighbor as thyself" (v'ahavta l'reacha kamocho, Leviticus 19:18). But this Biblical commandment hinges on the definition of "reah" which, if taken broadly, can mean "everyone who is not you" but, if taken narrowly, can mean "only those individuals who are closest to you."

As radio pastor Ralph W. Sockman observed: "The test of courage comes when we are in the minority but the test of tolerance comes when we are in the majority."
